From the pastor

More than a few people would rather have a tooth removed than to be asked to pray, whether it's a small group or a large group. So it's more than a little bit comforting to realize that Jesus' own disciples didn't know how to pray. In these verses from Luke, as soon as Jesus finished his prayer, those disciples immediately chorused in unison, "Lord, teach us to pray."

Teach you to pray? OK, Jesus said, when you pray, **pray like this**: "Father, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread. Forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us. And do not bring us to the time of trial."

What a great prayer! It touches on all the various facets of prayer: reverence and dependence on God, mercy, guidance and protection from God. This is definitely the prayer to use whenever you are called on to pray at a moment's notice, or if your heart is so heavy you can't think of anything to say or if your head is so jumbled that you are having trouble putting two words together, let alone compose an original prayer.

However, Jesus wanted to teach more than a prayer, and so he went on to tell a story to illustrate prayer.

Suppose we have a really good friend, the kind of friend we could call on in an emergency, and we go to that friend's house in the middle of the night for something that is less than an emergency. We haven't locked ourselves out of our house or had a kitchen fire. No, what brings us to this friend's door is an unexpected houseguest who has arrived. We need food for our houseguest. And we trust our friend enough that we beat on our friend's door at midnight in order to ask for provisions, knowing full well that our interruption has awakened not only our friend but the entire household. This is our really good friend, now, but he is honest and so doesn't open the door right away, but instead shouts back to us, "Go away! Can't you see I'm sleeping? That might deter someone else, but this is our really good friend, a friend whom we trust, so we don't stop knocking on the door. Finally that really good friend hops up, exasperated, yes, but gives us those three loaves of bread.

This is a rather strange story to tell in a teachable moment about prayer. Who is this really good friend

whom we trust, who is the grouch who shouts at us to go away before finally opening up the door and giving us what we asked for? Would it make sense for Jesus to tell a story in which the grumpy grouchy friend MIGHT be God?

Well, yes, because the story isn't about two strangers, but two friends. Two friends who go way back, they've laughed together and cried together, and watched each other's children grow up and seen each other through good times and bad times. Two friends who have a relationship.

When Jesus said, "pray like this..." and taught his disciples a handy prayer model to follow, he then told a story which in effect was saying, "And pray like this—like God is your closest friend, one you know well enough to know even in the middle of the night, the door will be opened, no matter how trivial or serious the request. Be so persistent and consistent in your prayers that even if you have the worst image of God, the door will be opened to you."

Because you know that if your child asked your most trusted friend for a fish—even if that friend was a grouch—that friend wouldn't give your child a snake. And if your child asked your most trusted friend for an egg—even if it was midnight and your friend didn't want to get up—that friend wouldn't give your child a scorpion.

No one with whom we have a good relationship would give a snake or a scorpion to one of our children. So if those of us who are flawed, sinful—and let's add Jesus' word, "evil"—people can figure out how to good gifts to our children, won't God do as much if not more?

If we humans can get it right, shouldn't we trust that God will get it right, too? And we should be confident, too, that God won't make some of the incredible blunders that we surely make with the children or adults who are entrusted to our care.

When you pray, Jesus said, pray using these words. When you pray, pray persistently, confidently, without embarrassment. When you pray, remember that God gives more to us than we can even give each other, and the "more" is the gift of the Holy Spirit. The gift of the Holy Spirit is a loving presence which doesn't necessarily change the situation, "but can

often change us as it brings their comfort and love to the situation — and perhaps [we] are better able to accept what lies in the future with their support. [We] can live with the uncertainty, patiently waiting together to see what will happen.”

Jesus' teachable moment is about the relationship between God and God's children. Prayer is creating and nourishing a relationship with God, trusting that God is with us and God is listening to our most trivial concerns, our deepest fears, our heartfelt desires, our greatest sorrows.

Go ahead, Jesus told his disciples—start praying, Father, “Father, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread. Forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us. And do not bring us to the time of trial.”

And start asking, seeking, knocking. Our God—who is better than our grumpiest, grouchiest friend; who loves us, who watches over us, will give what we ask, will open when we knock, will help us find what we are searching for; will hear and answer all our prayers.

ADULT EDUCATION IN JUNE AND JULY

The Adult Sunday School class will continue its study of the Gospel of Mark through the summer. The Gospel of Mark is the oldest gospel, believed to have been written between 66 and 70 CE, as well as being the shortest gospel. Biblical scholars view Mark as the gospel which encouraged other gospels to be written, noting that both Matthew and Luke borrow sayings and stories from Mark. The class meets in the parlor on Sunday mornings at 9:30 a.m.



HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE SESSION Moderator: Rev. Sally Hughes STATED MEETING OF THE SESSION APRIL 24, 2018

The Session reported the work on relocating the NES power pole and the relocation of the electrical power supply coming into the church building had been completed. The \$12,845.00 expense for relocating the powerline entry point would be paid from the Trinity/LWS Joint Capital Fund account. Howell Farms had made its agreed initial payment to Trinity and their tent was now open on Trinity's property.

The Trinity/LWS Shared Space Committee reported a successful meeting with the Linden Waldorf Board of Directors on April 23. It was noted the school wants to strengthen its relationship with Trinity. Both sides are eager to come to an agreement on a new Shared Space Agreement for the next two academic years, beginning July 1, 2018.

An agreement has been reached with the Camp Gladiator group to hold exercise classes on Trinity's lower lawn. There will be classes three days a week and Camp Gladiator will pay Trinity \$5 a class. Trinity was approached by members of the First Church of Christ, Scientist on Hillsboro Road about the possibility of their congregation using Trinity's facilities for worship for a short time after they sell their building. The sense of the Session was it would welcome them to share our space if details could be worked out.

Elder Bill Dougherty was elected to serve as Trinity's delegate to the May 5, Presbytery Meeting in Tullahoma. 4

A proposal to protect the Fresco Mural in the Parlor with a Plexiglas cover was presented. After a brief discussion it was decided to take no action until the art work could be professionally evaluated. Elder Schomber would try to contact appropriate fine art appraisers.

Trinity's status as an Earthcare Congregation was renewed.

The Session agreed Trinity should provide needed work clothing for member Claude Spencer who is entering a state work release program. Although his work as a welder will be in the Memphis area ship yards, Spence maintains his membership at Trinity. The congregation will be given the opportunity to contribute the purchase of the work clothes.

A possible solution to providing LWS badly needed classroom space while not giving up the Parlor, might come from a renovation of the current pastor's office and nursery room by taking out the wall between them. The Pastor said she was comfortable with the idea of moving her space to the Parlor as needed. She noted she does a lot of her study work and church preparation from home. The session agreed to "allow Linden Waldorf School to explore in concept the combining of the Pastor's Office and Nursery into a new room."



EVENING SERVICES SET FOR JULY AND AUGUST

On Sunday, July 29th, we'll have a worship service on the beautiful grounds of Trinity, which will be preceded by a picnic. Please plan to invite your friends and family to this food-and-worship event.

The picnic will begin at 4:30 p.m. and the church will furnish and prepare grilled hamburgers and hotdogs, buns, and condiments, chips, and drinks. The congregation is asked to bring lawn chairs for both the picnic and the worship service and also to bring your favorite picnic sides and desserts. As the time approaches for the worship service and picnic, more details will be provided in the bulletin and the Friday e-mail.

For the August 26 end-of-summer worship service, there will be a church-and-community ice cream social preceding at 4:30 p.m. Complete details will be available in the August newsletter, the Friday e-mail, and the bulletin.

Please help to encourage folks who currently do not have a church home to participate in both summer events. Also, since we typically have visitors moving to Nashville from out-of-town in the summertime, as you greet them in June, July, and August, please make sure to invite them to both the picnic and the ice cream social.

AVOIDING SCAMS WHILE ON VACATION

As summer quickly approaches, keep Benjamin Franklin's words of wisdom in mind: "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." Here are some tips to keep you, your family and identity safe while enjoying your vacation.

Notify your bank. Traveling out of state or overseas while using your bankcard could cause a fraud alert to appear and suspend your account. A quick phone call can prevent this hassle.

Be cautious when searching for rental properties on websites like Craigslist. A legitimate rental will not ask for payment via wire transfer.

Avoid stand-alone ATMS's. Scammers like these because they are able to attach a credit card skimmer with less risk of detection.

Stay on guard even in your hotel. If you receive a phone call from the "front desk" asking you to confirm your payment method, hang up. It's a scam. If the hotel really has an issue, they will ask you to come to the front desk.

Stay alert. Identity thieves' techniques evolve. Especially in the technological age but some will always rely on good old-fashioned pickpocketing. Safeguard your wallet, purse and phones.

Save the social media posts. Wait until you are home to share the photos of your family vacation. You don't want to announce when your home will be empty.

Make sure you place a hold on newspaper and mail deliveries. A full mailbox or several newspapers in your driveway are sure signs no one is home.

Only take what you will need. Leave the extra credit/bank cards at home. Do you really need your social security card with you? Birth certificate? If not, leave it at home.

Take photocopies or a picture of all the information in your wallet. That includes front and back photos of your credit/bank cards,

I.D., passport, etc. Keep the copies in a safe place, not your wallet or purse.

Be wary of free Wi-Fi. Free means open air-waves and everything you do is transmitted over an unsecured connection and makes you vulnerable. Some Wi-Fi connections are fake and are set up by hackers just to steal your information. Always double check with the location to see if it is official.

Don't leave expensive or important belongings in the hotel room. Use the safe if one is provided in the room. If not, ask the front desk for another alternative.

Many credit/bank cards are now equipped with RFID (radio frequency identification) chips, which makes stealing your information easier for high-tech scammers. Consider using a RFID blocking wallet, purse or case.

Most importantly, if anything does happen, act fast. Contact the bank or credit card company as well as the credit reporting bureaus. If your ID is stolen, file a police report immediately. This is necessary for creating a paper trail as well as a timeframe for the theft. If traveling overseas and your passport is lost or stolen, contact the nearest U.S. Embassy or Consulate, they can help you with a replacement. You should also call the local police and file a report. Sources: Lifelock and the Better Business Bureau
